#### HOLIDAY ETIQUETTE

Holiday entertaining can not only be a tradition that we value but a heck of a lot of planning and organizing during one of the most hectic times of year. To keep holid entertaining in your love (not loathe) category, here are some tips for getting the holidays off to a good start!

- Get invitations out early. People's calendars fill up fast, so plan your holiday party guest list and send out your invitations four to six weeks before your party. Decorate early. There are always a zillion little tasks that need to happen the day of your party—and usually the day before it, too. If your house is decorated early, you'll have less stress—and more time to enjoy the decorations. If you are planning to hire a caterier or order special foods, do it early. This is the busiest time for all businesses, and you want to be on their calendar first. If not all your muest are vaccinated be confident in stating your household.

Remember when it comes to family holiday gatherings to try to take family traditions and family members' personal holiday favorites into consideration. If aunt June's mince meat pie is her thing at the holiday table, the more options and contributions the merrier is the attitude to strike.

For large family gatherings it's okay to ask family to contribute to the party. When you call or reach out to invite, let the family know you're going to be doing a group effort or a holiday pot luck this year and you're hoping they could bring one of the following. Always give your guests options when asking them to bring items for the meal and do your best not to micromanage - let them bring their own version of Brussels sprout, rather than sending them your favorite recipe - or if the Brussels sprout recipe is precious and a must-do, do that item yourself. "Julianna, I'm so glad you and Eliza can make it! Everyone's bringing a dish or something to meal, would you like to be on drinks, a side dish (we already have potatoes and the green beans covered) or a dessert?" It's also good to let guests know what will and won't be available in the kitchen. "The turkey is going to be in the oven, so we won't have room to cook anything at the house, but we can reheat anything once the ham is done."

# THANK-YOU NOTES

Giving thanks shouldn't be a chore—and doesn't have to be if you make the effort to keep it interesting. This is a brief note, about three to five sentences, meant to express what you're grateful for. Be sure to say what you mean directly.

Use a salutation

- utation.

  Formal/Professional use "Dear {{title}} {{last\_Name}},

  Professional Dear {{first\_Name}} {{last\_Name}},

  Close Professional/Social Dear {{first\_Name}},

  Social Dearest {{first\_Name}},

  Good friend First name, Nickname, or Initials

- First sentence Thank them explicitly for the specific gift or act for which you are

eciated

writing the letter.

- I am writing this note to acknowledge...I want you to know how much I value...

Second Sentence-Personalize the note with an original thought about the things you are thanking for, the effort or thought behind it, what it means to you and therelationship

- Fourth sentence repeat the thanks or offer a concluding thought.

  Professional/Social Best regards, Regards, All the best, Best, Respectfully yours, Cordially
  Social/Personal Yours truly, Warmly, Affectionately yours, With great affection, With love, etc.
